SEVEN OTHERS HURT: ALL WILL RECOVER

Accident Occurred Near Fourd's Store and Was Due to the Slippery Condition of Rosduay.

With three men dead and seven others injured, tragedy stalks unchallenged in the little community of Cranston Heights today, as the result of an accident shortly before 11 o'clock last night, when the Cranston Heights fire apparatus overturned responding to a slight fire.

The Dead.

Alfred Ogden, 21 Cranston Heights, who died in the Delaware Hospital shortly before I e'clock this morning.

Edward Ainsworth, 19 years old of the Codars, who died while being taken to the Romeopathic Rospital.

David Hook, 10 years old, of Cran-ston Heights, who died at the Dela-ware Hospital while being operated on. His skull was fractured. operated.

LeRoy Hill, 25 years old, of Cranston Lieights, taken to Physicians' and Surgeons' Hospital with his left less fractured below the knee and numergua incerations of the head and hody.

The accident occurred when the early numping engine, carrying new of ten men, was on its way the heavy crew of ten men, was on he way the home of Mrs. Grace Emerson, He way to Marshallton-In attempting to make a turn near Fourd's store, the truck shidded on a sheet of ice covering the road, careened into a tree and turned over. Many of the men were thrown clear of the enachine, but Ainsworth, Hook and Ooden were caught under 1,000 feet of hose as it was hursed

from the body of the truck.
Passing machines were comman deered, and the injured men were roshed to hospitals. Glennwood rushed to hospitals. Glennwood Storgis, a store-keeper near by, after to lift the hose from the prisoned men, took Opden to the Dela-ware Hospital in an automobile. At the Delaware Hospital, vain efforts were made to save his life, but he died five hours later.
